Second-place winner will receive a \$25.00 gift certificate or a paid FACC membership for 2024 of their choice.

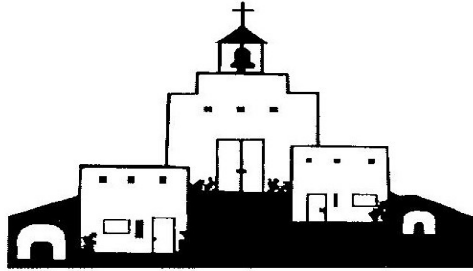

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# LA CAPILLA DE SAN FRANCISCO DE ASSISI

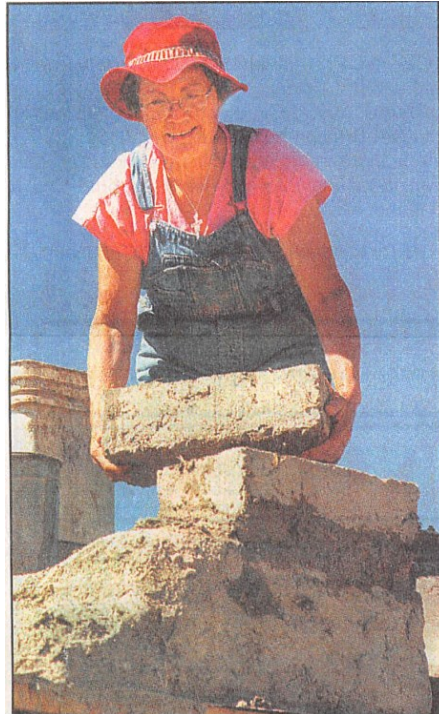
## BOONE, COLORADO



This special chapel was built almost entirely by the late Toni Valdez, starting in the summer of 1997 and completing 3 years later. She was in her mid-sixties at the time. She had received an inspiration to do this a few years earlier and the thought would simply not leave her. Her husband, the late George Valdez, and youngest son, the late Anthony Valdez, initially dug and poured a concrete foundation to support the heavy walls. From there Toni took over, forming hundreds of adobe blocks and drying them in the sun. She made approximately 1,000 adobe blocks, each one weighing about 38 pounds. Roof beams (vigas) were purchased in Westcliff, Colorado. Roofing for an adobe building takes special care and Toni's and George's Godson, Anthony Soto from Avondale, provided his assistance and expertise. Note that she had no plans, or even sketches. It was all in her head, and certainly divinely inspired.

People began to take notice as the building began to rise. Early in the process, Toni received a visit from the Pueblo County Building Department, telling her she needed a permit to build what she intended. She politely disagreed and went about her work, and word of this encounter spread but the building inspector never returned. It is believed that someone in authority told him to leave her alone.

Later and as the chapel construction progressed, Toni's chapel was featured in the The Denver Post, The Pueblo Chieftain and other local publications and various newspapers across the country. She was also interviewed by the Henry Reyes with the local Spanish language radio station.



Toni's scaffolding consisted of two 55 gallon drums with a thick piece of lumber between. She was advised against the glass cross on the back wall because it might weaken the structure but she was determined to have this feature and went ahead with it anyway. Over twenty years have now passed and the glass cross has proven to be the correct decision.

Completion of the chapel occurred in July of 2000 and a blessing and dedication mass took place officiated by Bishop Arthur Tafoya of the Diocese of Pueblo, Father Maurice Gallagher of the Sacred Heart and St. Williams parishes of Avondale and Boone, Colorado. Retired Bishop Charles Buswell also participated in the chapel blessing; in fact one of his favorite photographs was taken of him praying in the chapel with the glass cross in the background.

The chapel was dedicated to the spirit of St. Francis of Assisi, to whom Toni was devoted through her participation and longstanding association with the Sisters of Saint Francis.

## A Blast from the Past By Charlene Garcia Simms



This year FACC celebrates our 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary. We hope to have a small celebration later this year. Following is an article I wrote right after our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2009.

### FACC 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration a Success by Charlene Garcia Simms

*Abrazos, Gritos y Risa* could be seen and heard all over the Ryals room at the Rawlings Library for the FACC 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration. Genealogists are early risers and we had almost everyone registered by 8:30 a.m. and by 9:00 a.m. Dolores Valdez de Pong was telling us the story of Fray Angelico Chavez. Someone asked me why we had named the chapter after him, and I told them the story about Mike Baca, our first FACC president suggesting this. At one of our general membership meetings, it was voted unanimously to do so because this great man was very interesting as well as a scholar who makes our genealogy research easier with his publication, *Origins of New Mexico Families* among others. Thanks to Dolores for her wonderful PowerPoint presentation where she gave us much insight into Fray Chavez. How many of you knew he was an artist? How many of you knew he was a military man? How many of you knew he left the priesthood for a short time?

By 10:00 a.m. people were situated either in a beginning genealogy session with Pat Sanchez Rau or a presentation by Teresa Vigil on natural herbs. Pat had a good crowd and motivated several members and newcomers to either start or offered suggestions to get over roadblocks that often discourage us from going forward. Teresa, a rural herbal practitioner from the San Luis Valley, uses natural healing methods traditional to the upper Rio Grande bioregion. As you entered the room, you could smell the fragrances of your grandmother's house and as she shared her experience and knowledge of medicinal herbs and natural remedies, one could see most people nodding their heads remembering the days when there were no doctors readily available, only *medicas*, and absolutely no HMO's. Mothers had to use their instincts and herbal medicinal knowledge that had been passed on from generation to generation. Teresa will be back in Pueblo on October 16 at the Rawlings Main Library to make another presentation.

There were several informational tables and vendors. Clara Martinez was there with her delicious *capulin* and *champe* jellies, and she had some *PIÑON* which was gone before I could even get in line. Christina Lefebre had a room full of people who listened to her short presentation on *How to Organize your information*. At some point we need to bring her back for a full day workshop. Lunch was served and Angel Cervantes arrived with his wife, Anna, and immediately became surrounded with people asking questions about the New Mexico DNA project. Angel was our presenter in the afternoon and was knowledgeable, funny and intriguing. He got several people to join the project. This was followed by Sendi Pergrino with a reading of *Walt Whiteman Strides the Llano of New Mexico by Rudolfo Anaya*. Juan and Deborah Espinosa introduced everyone to the *Song of Pueblo*, a musical about Pueblo history.

With the help of retired Judge, Joe Ulibarri, we then recognized our founders, charter members, past presidents and members who have gone beyond the call of duty in what they have done for the chapter. They were presented with anniversary pins. The following charter members were present: Eloy and Socorro Arellano, Betty Duran, Tony Garcia, Lucy Gettler, Marty Hill, Deborah Martinez-Martinez, John Medina, Lydia Montoya, Deborah Espinosa, Margaret Turner, Charlene Garcia Simms, Anastacio and Eleanor Valdez. For those who were not present, the pins will be presented at the September meeting and mailed out for those not attending. The pins will go on sale in October for all to buy.

The finale included a beautiful cake and lemonade to commemorate the event, more *abrazos*, this time saying good-by, and the *gritos* came from *tres caballeros*, Ernie Charlifu, Angel Cervantes, and Elmer Espinosa as they sang acapella several of Jose Jimenez' songs. How many of you knew Angel could hit all those musical notes?

Thanks to Vickie Arellano and her committee, Rita, Richard, Gladys, Eleanor, and Arnie for planning and executing a wonderful day. Special thanks to the library for allowing me the time to help the planning committee, donating the facilities, marketing materials and part of the presenter fees. Thanks also to all the raffle drawing donors. The winner of the Fray Angelico Chavez quilt was Patricia Salazar from Denver who is a non-member. During the day, she met a new *prima*, Juanita Ulibarri. Pat felt the quilt should stay with a member from the chapter and gave it to her new found cousin.

John and Clorinda Medina were charter members of FACC, meaning they were with the chapter from the beginning since 1989. Over the years they gave and gave of their time, resources and love of genealogy. They were both from Huerfano County. Clorinda was related to me through my Manchego line through her King line. John and Clorinda were inseparable. I don't remember ever seeing them apart and why I have this need to write about both of them.

Maria Clorinda Medina was born in Del Carbon, Colorado. She passed away on February 14, 2024, at the age of 86. She was preceded in death by her husband, John Ignacio Medina; and her parents, Emma King Gomez and Seledon Gomez. She is survived by her daughter, Diane and granddaughter Tiana. Clorinda and John were married in May 1960 in Walsenburg, Colorado and moved to Pueblo, to start their married life. In 2010, they had a beautiful 50th wedding anniversary and renewed their wedding vows. Maria enjoyed working in her flower beds, painting, coloring and loved the color green. Maria and John enjoyed traveling, genealogy, and their Pomeranian dogs who I remember vividly.

Johnny Ignacio Medina, died on January 30, 2016 at the age of 83. John and Clorinda were married for 56 years. John retired as an ammunition inspector from Pueblo Army Depot after 36 years of service at 55 years old, October 31, 1987. He enjoyed traveling, carpentry, genealogy, music, movies, but especially James Bond movies. John's biggest joy was his granddaughter "Tiana", they shared a special bond as they spent a lot of quality time together.

I never called John Medina, John. I always called him Mr. Medina, as well as did most of our members. I don't know why. He was so kind and respectful to everyone. It seems he deserved that title as an elder. John and Clorinda were with us since the beginning of the FACC chapter and it is because of people like them, with integrity, and generosity, and curiosity that has brought us to our 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary. It is very sad for me to lose people like Clorinda, John and Ruben who I feel are "Salt of the Earth" people from the greatest generation. John and Clorinda Medina Presente!



Ruben Joe Rodriguez was born on September 13, 1931, and passed away on February 28 at the age of 93. Ruben was preceded in death by his first wife, Marcella of 25 years and his second wife, Dolores of 29 years. He is survived by his sons Marcos and Daniel and daughters, Hazel, Veronica, Rebecca and Bonnie, all by his first wife, daughters-in-law, Irene Rodriguez and Anita Guerra, and several grandchildren, great-grandchildren, many relatives, and friends.

Ruben grew up in Huerfano County and joined the army in August 1952 at the age of 19. He fought in the Korean War in 1953. He retired from the Pueblo Army Depot after 36 years. During his retirement, Ruben wrote a wonderful book, "The Conflict in Korea, 1953, Last Stand for Pork Chop Hill," of which we have a copy in the FACC library, as well as several copies at the Rawlings library, special collections. According to his family, Fishing with his kids and grandkids was one of the special things he loved to do, and we are told he was usually the one that would catch the fish!

Ruben loved sharing his stories from his past and was an avid genealogist. He was a member of FACC for over 25 years. When he joined, I was president of FACC, and he immediately told me he was ready to help in any way he could and that he was a good bookkeeper. We immediately took him up on his readiness to help and voted him in as treasurer, a position he would hold for almost twenty years. Ruben is the one who helped us get our raffle license and kept us legal, filing all the proper documents in a timely manner. He was one of the most dependable people I ever met. At every monthly meeting it was Ruben who would bring out the red rolling box where people put their raffle tickets and I can still remember him calling the numbers of the winners. We made several hundreds of dollars with the raffle each year, and who can forget the 50/50. Later, Richard Arellano would start helping him with this big task. He also managed the raffle for the national GSHA conferences held in Colorado.

He loved to go to Cripple Creek with his family and for the FACC fundraisers. He was a big winner and his daughter shared that he always shared his winnings with his children. His second wife, Dolores, a lovely person, did not share in Ruben's love of genealogy but she supported his research efforts and all the time he gave to the chapter. She always attended our parties with him and was a lovely woman. I agree with his daughter who stated that he was such a kind man with a big heart and loving soul, if he could help you he would. He had so many friends no matter where he was. If someone saw him, they wouldn't hesitate to come up and say hi and have a lengthy conversation. You will receive an invitation to our FACC meeting through an email. A few minutes before the meeting, go to the email and click on the link to the meeting and follow the instructions, however, ignore the message that tells you to download the Zoom app if you already have it downloaded. Once you get in you will be placed in a Waiting Room. We will see who is in the Waiting Room and let you in to the meeting.

**IMPORTANT:** We will set up the meeting with your microphone muted, so please do not unmute your microphone. Muting everyone except the administrators and the presenter will keep background talk from ruining the presentation. At the end of the meeting you can use the Chat button to write in any questions you may have for the presenter.

One last thing. Some desktop computers do not have a camera and/or a microphone, which may not allow you to set up the program. Other than that, it's really pretty easy. Let's see if we can have a lot more people join our next Zoom meeting.

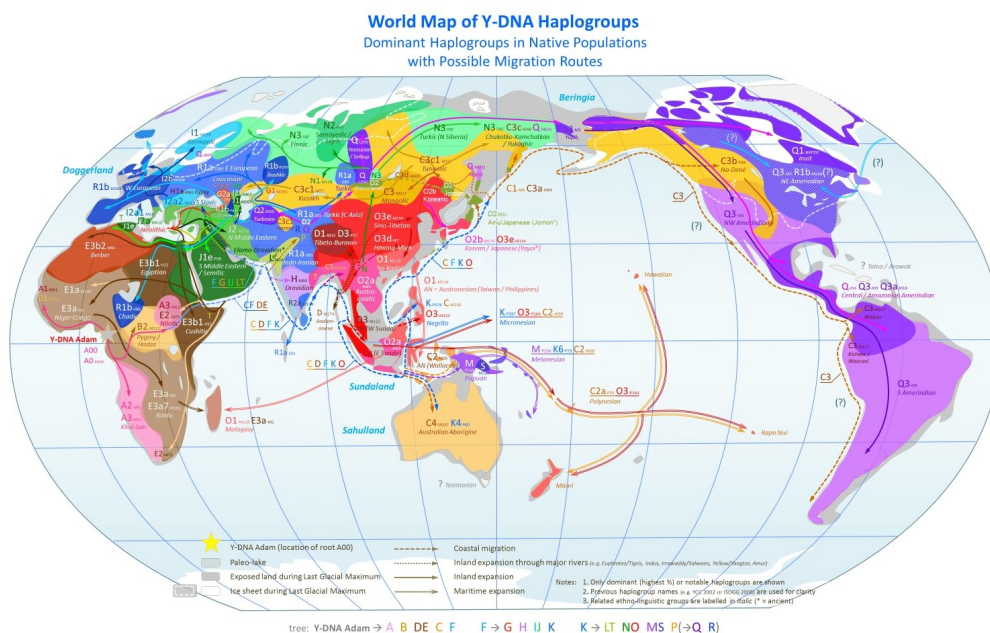

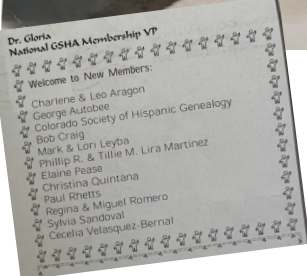

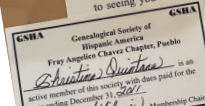
